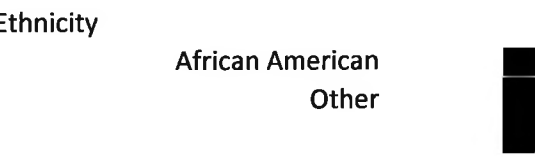
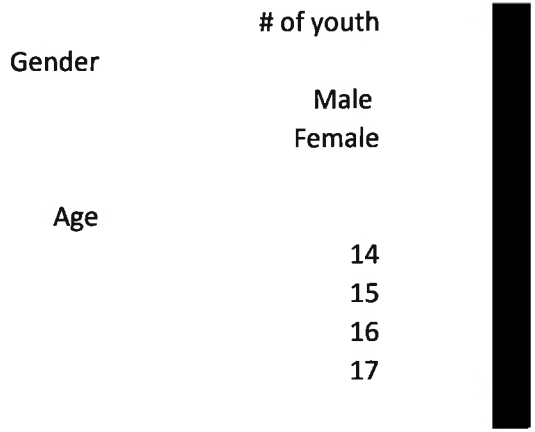

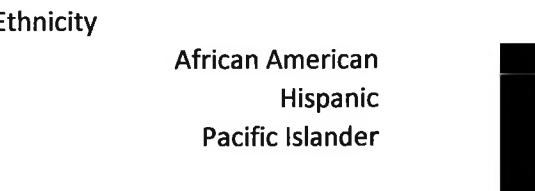

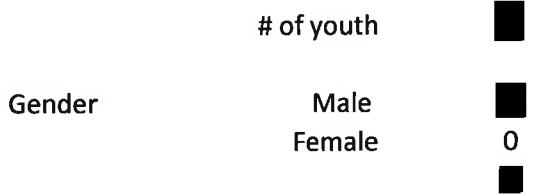

Construction trades classroom opens at Evergreen Academy

FAIRFIELD — The ribbon was cut and a new era was ushered in Wednesday on a new trades classroom at the Solano County Probation Department's Juvenile Detention Facility.

Solano County Superintendent of Schools Lisette Estrella-Henderson said incarcerated youth "have such potential and that's what today is all about."

"They've made mistakes," Estrella-Henderson said. "They have skills. They just need a hand up. This is a way to help make them positive contributors to society. This is a long time in coming."

The trades classroom at the Evergreen Academy is a collaborative effort between the Solano County Probation Department and the Solano County Office of Education. The aim of the new classroom is to help reduce recidivism through educational and vocational training that is both applicable and marketable after the students leave the facility.

"No youth wants to be here and we're not saying they aren't being held accountable," Probation Chief Chris Hansen said, "but we want them to know they have the ability to be productive. These are smart kids with a lot of potential. We want them to leave here with the ability to thrive and succeed."

The new classroom features eight workstations that include occupational safety, HVAC, plumbing, electrical, masonry, concrete, drywall, roof framing

and woodworking. Students already receive academic learning, but this is an opportunity to receive credit toward high school graduation as well as an opportunity to receive the National Center of Construction Education and Research Safety Certification.

Safety is also of the utmost concern. There is an eye-wash station in the room and ventilation tubes on each side of the room to carry out particles and other exhaust.

The course is taught by career technical education teacher Terrell Parr and classroom special Sabrina True. They will offer students hands-on training that will include guest speakers from various trades.

“Some of the students weren’t very motivated at first,” Parr said. “Now they are asking if they can work extra hours, stay 30 minutes afterward. They really enjoy the class. This new classroom is now stepping it up a notch. The industry needs workers.”

Fidel Chavez of the NorCal Carpenters Union was at the ceremony and said the new program creates “an opportunity for the people in Fairfield to become carpenter apprentices.”

“We are looking forward to building a partnership and to help grow this program,” Chavez said.

Students are vetted for the opportunity to use the classroom, just as they are for being allowed other privileges, like use of the common rooms. The

detention center has many volatile cases and the trades room is a privilege to create and learn with tools and other accessories of the trades.

“This program is important for the students’ lives,” said Valerie Garrett, assistant director of education options for the Solano County Office of Education. “This is a life opportunity to reach heights they never thought they could reach, especially heights where they can have a positive future as they move on as a young person.”
