Plan Summary [2023-24]

General Information

A description of the LEA, its schools, and its students in grades transitional kindergarten–12, as applicable to the LEA.

Tehama Oaks is a Juvenile Court School in Tehama County, California. The school operates under the Local Educational Agency of Tehama County Department of Education (TCDE). We serve all students who are adjudicated to the Juvenile Detention Facility, also called the Juvenile Justice Center (JJC) located in Red Bluff, CA. Red Bluff and its surrounding rural areas have a population of about 14,000 residents. Students come to this facility from six counties: Tehama, Lake, Glenn, Siskiyou, Plumas, and Trinity. The school operates in a mutual partnership with Tehama County Probation Department to provide comprehensive services addressing the whole child. We collaborate to meet the probation department's education program goals as well as the goals of our Student Learner Outcomes, TCDE, and the state of California. As of October 2022, we had 22 students in grades 7-12. This number fluctuates frequently as the facility population is always changing. Two fully credentialed teachers deliver direct instruction aligned to Common Core standards in all core subjects daily. Classified staff includes one paraprofessional and a transition specialist who serve the needs of the students and support the teaching staff daily. Tehama Oaks operates year-round and provides 283 minutes of school each day, (California Education Code 48645.3 requires 240 minutes). Students are divided into two self-contained classrooms. Classrooms have small group sizes and high adult-to-student ratios giving students the benefit of individualized support and interaction with caring adults. Due to the fluidity of enrollment, the demographics also change. 100% of our students are considered within the unduplicated category. We also range from 1 - 4 EL students throughout the school year.

Students typically enroll with an average reading and math proficiency level of 4th-5th grade. Programs are personalized based on the individual needs of students. The curriculum is adapted to meet the individual learning needs of students. A part-time Education Specialist provides support to students with disabilities as well as related service providers as designated by their IEPs. The school also employs a part-time School Counselor to provide college and career readiness support. All students are evaluated upon entry into reading and math levels. Intervention is provided based on assessed needs. Tehama Oaks students are a vulnerable population that has generally failed in traditional education settings. These students are incarcerated, at-risk youth, many of whom have experienced extensive trauma from

poverty, abuse, neglect, exploitation, drug and alcohol dependence, and violence. Many of these students are in danger of dropping out of school, and they have often had negative experiences associated with school failure. Our main goals are to provide a safe and supportive place for learning, credit recovery, and progress toward graduation. We are committed to teaching both social-emotional skills as well as academic skills and providing an opportunity for students to learn additional skills through access to college and career readiness activities. All youth have access to a mental health clinician to support their mental wellness and build prosocial skills related to health, wellness, and decision-making behaviors.

Parents of incarcerated students are included whenever possible. For example, parents of JJC students receiving Special Education services are invited to IEP meetings and many do attend if by phone. The challenge of including parents in the education of incarcerated youth has become complicated with the recent enrollment of youth from the Lake, Glenn, and Siskiyou counties. Distance, confidentiality, and safety are considerations. JJC staff and the JJC Site Council are considering alternative ways of engaging and communicating with parents, some of which are technology-based. As wards of the court, these students are highly mobile and may remain in custody for a few days or for months. The Chief Probation officer serves these students "in loco parentis" and the School Site Council serves as the Parent Advisory Committee.

As students are required to attend school while incarcerated. Our Attendance rate as of May 31, 2023, is 99.08% with an ADA of 18.17.

Middle school dropout rate - Rarely does a middle school student attend Tehama Oaks, and when they do they must attend school. The same is true for high school dropout rates. While in the juvenile detention center, students must attend school. Our staff is dedicated to ensuring students who are within our program are working toward their high school diploma requirements and if they are still within our custody upon completion are issued a diploma.

Reflections: Successes

A description of successes and/or progress based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

Tehama Oaks is a Dashboard Alternative School. With small numbers, very little data is populated on the dashboard. In 2022 we had a graduation rate of 78%. An analysis of the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessment results in ELA and Math shows that our students are very challenged academically. Most have faced ongoing truancy, and academic challenges during their time in school. Results of the 2021/2022 Smarter Balance Assessment indicate that 100% of our students did not meet the standard in English or Math. However, Star Renaissance assessment is utilized as a local measure to demonstrate student growth in math and reading with 77% of our students demonstrating growth in ELA and 8% demonstrating growth in Math. In comparison to previous years, a higher (80%) students expressed a positive feeling of safety at the school. We also maintained a high attendance rate with 0% chronic absenteeism. All curriculum is standards aligned and was implemented with fidelity. Facilities were maintained that supported the learning and we continue to make progress in developing space for career and tech electives.

In 2022, we had 7 graduates and 0 met the status of College and Career Ready. However, each of these graduates did complete the FAFSA.

Data collected and used for LCAP analysis and review include JJC School Site Council meeting notes, JJC student and staff focus groups, instructional program evaluation, and individual student academic achievement. From this analysis, JJC progress included:

- ~ a continuation of elective opportunities to include music and art workshops, MakerSpace activities, career readiness activities, and construction.
- ~ post-graduation plans written for all eligible students
- ~ implementation of a comprehensive assessment system for JJC and provision of academic
- ~ interventions based on assessment data
- ~ all eligible students securing food handler certificates,
- ~ Introduction to CTE programs and exploration of CTE Pathways through VR platform, and
- ~ stronger communication and collaboration between JJC staff and probation staff.

Foster Youth: A strong system of support was in place for the Foster Youth in our county. The two specialists actively engaged in training of site liaisons, provided monthly compliance updates along with strategies for addressing the needs of our foster youth, and actively participating in monthly meetings focused on addressing the needs of individual students who were identified as needing more intensive supports.

Expelled Youth: The expelled youth plan was effectively implemented with all expelled youth being appropriately placed within regional programs operated by specific districts.

BUILDING ON SUCCESS: Students had a more positive experiences which related to the increased of SEL applications from the PD given to the teachers. We'll expand on this by continuing in an SEL CADRE PD as we continue to promote the wellbeing of students through connection building strategies that include helping students make personal connections with staff and peers. We will hire additional staff (teacher) to further these relationships with students and have gone the extra mile to hire a full time administrator to guide the work.

Reflections: Identified Need

The majority of our students come to Tehama Oaks three to four grade levels below in math and English Language Arts. Students' individual efforts and interest in school are closely related to their performance however previous years indicate that our students perform low in mathematics and English language arts. We are working to increase the engagement and academic achievement of all student groups. The school has invested in additional paraprofessional support as well as an intervention program for reading. Staffing challenges have continued to plague Tehama Oaks and we have been unable to sustain an additional paraeducator this year. As our students continue to

perform well below grade level increasing academic achievement and college and career readiness through the use of technology and standards-based instructional practices that also embed social-emotional needs are areas of focus. Supports through Mental Health and Social/Emotional strategies are essential in giving our students the skills they need to address the negative impacts of trauma as they seek to improve themselves personally in an effort to engage more positively within the community on their exit from the Juvenile system.

To address staffing, we continue to need creative solutions for filling paraprofessional positions and the transition specialist position as well as strengthening supports for our staff through a full time administrator.

LCAP Highlights

This LCAP demonstrates continuous improvements in direct instruction of the Common Core Aligned curriculum to increase student skills in all content areas. Tehama Oaks was able to provide in-person instruction for the full 2023-2024 school year. Purposeful direct intervention in missing skills will supplement the curriculum to help accelerate student learning. We have transitioned our intervention program to provide a platform that we believe provides a stronger sense of knowledge than a measure of students' stamina. A broad course of study including enrichment opportunities, arts and music, social-emotional learning, and vocational instruction, along with college and career planning will assist students in developing goals and plans for their future. The LCAP includes additional support for consultation with our Expanded Learning team, College and Career Counseling, Social and emotional assessments, and learning along with increased student access to technology to provide increased levels of student engagement and modalities of learning. Two students who have graduated within Tehama Oaks have been supported through our partnership with Bridge to College and Career, to complete their FAFSA's and enroll in a local Institute of Higher Education, Shasta College. The LCAP includes resources for social-emotional learning (SEL) for both students and staff as well as the continued need to grow in the areas of diversity, equity, and inclusion. Staff have and will continue to participate in professional development in these areas in the 2023-2024 school year. Funds are also being allocated to hire a full time administrator who is able to ensure coordination of all LCAP resources and addressing staffing challenges.

We will continue to offer strong supports to districts and sites in addressing the needs of Foster Youth as well as assisting districts in addressing placement needs of their expelled youth. Utilizing the continuous improvement processes, we are also supporting districts and sites through improvement teams addressing reducing suspensions that lead to expulsions by addressing student and staff needs.

Engaging Educational Partners

A summary of the process used to engage educational partners and how this engagement was considered before finalizing the LCAP.

The Principal for Tehama Oaks leads the LCAP development process. Multiple engagement opportunities including meetings and outreach were conducted to review the LCAP as well as to support the development of the 2021-2023 LCAP.

Student engagement sessions were held in January 2023 and May 2023. Students gave input on how they feel about Tehama Oaks, instruction, safety, and, opportunities while they attend the school. Students were surveyed again in Fall 2022 and Spring 2023.

Parents were surveyed in Spring 2023. Facility staff were surveyed in Spring 2023. Staff, Parent, Probation, and student feedback was heard and considered at each of the quarterly Site Council/PAC meetings.

Staff, including teachers and other school personnel, were involved with LCAP activities and services on a daily basis. Staff, including teachers and other school personnel, as needed meet every other Wednesday afternoon for instructional planning and monitoring of LCAP actions and services with feedback incorporated into the LCAP development. Tehama Oaks has also aligned our WASC action items with our LCAP to build a throughline across documents and our implementation of services/supports to have positive outcomes for our students. Staff were surveyed during the Spring of 2023 as well as participating in focused conversations around analyzing the 22/23 LCAP effectiveness and to provide input on enhancements needed for the 23/24 year.

The School Site Council met quarterly to provide direction, review progress, and address LCAP implementation. As wards of the court, these students are highly mobile and may remain in custody for a few days or for months. The probation officers serve these students "in loco parentis" and the School Site Council serves as the Parent Advisory Committee. Tehama Oaks does not have an ELPAC due to the low number (less than 21) of EL students. Tehama County Certificated Employee Organization and CSEA are invited annually to participate in the development of the TCDE LCAP. Represented members are contributors to the development of the LCAP and attend School Site Council meetings.

Tehama Oaks data sets indicate the need for the following actions and services to be included in the update:

- 1. Student achievement on the 2022 SBAC and 2022/23 STAR assessments indicated a clear need for continued ELA/Reading and Math instruction and tutoring as well as intervention.
- 2. Parents report high levels of satisfaction. They have requested additional tutoring and support for students needing help with online classes and additional social or career opportunities for students.
- 3. Staff has reported a need for professional development in the area of supporting students with anxiety and depression or other mental health challenges as well as additional training on supporting students with previous trauma.

A summary of the feedback provided by specific educational partners.

Faculty: Appreciate the comfortable learning environment and the flexibility of the staff to adjust their teaching style for difficult students. Students are held accountability and teachers demonstrate enthusiasm. A suggestion was given to limit support staff entering the classroom who are not directly working with students so as to minimize any security risks. Another suggestion was to provide more new books.

80% agree the classroom is clean/safe.

100% agree staff support the social and emotional wellbeing of students and treat students respectfully.

80% feel the school provides a positive learning environment.

60% feel classroom rules are clear, fair, and consistently implemented.

100% feel teachers adjust to the learning needs of students, feel the school program helps prepare students for the future and that they can communicate with the school

100% feel they know how to communicate with the school if they have concerns.

80% belief the school staff enjoy working at the school.

100% feel staff greet students in a positive way and handle student complaints appropriately.

80% feel staff morale is high.

Student Discussion Feedback: 11 students participated, 3 female, 8 male. 3-4 have been here less than 1 month.

Student Survey Responses:

80% feel physically safe at school

76% feel emotionally safe at school

90% feel school has a positive learning environment

85% feel they are learning things that will help them in the future

98% feel they have the academic help needed to be successful

71% feel that staff prepare them for graduation, college and career.

63% feel the level of work is just right; 20% feel is easier and 17% feel it is harder.

90% feel behavior expectations are clear and fair.

93% feel they understand what is needed to progress towards graduation.

Some comments on the survey include:

- * more teamwork
- * have more fund things to do such as cooking
- * more comfortable classroom such as providing beanbags
- * desiring more "new stuff"
- * bringing back snacks and ways for students to earn rewards.
- * positive classroom management

Summary: Overall students feel physically safe at the school and that the supports are available to help them be successful with academics. Students expressed desire for more preparation for graduation and college career and additional resources within the classroom that make the classroom more comfortable and also more resources and elective courses. Staff feel the school is positively Staff feel their is a comfortable learning environment and appreciate the flexibility of the staff to adjust their teaching style for difficult students. Students are held accountability and teachers demonstrate enthusiasm. A suggestion was given to limit support staff entering the classroom who are not directly working with students so as to minimize any security risks. Another suggestion was to provide more new books.

A description of the aspects of the LCAP that were influenced by specific input from educational partners.

Staff, students, and parents provided valuable input in the development of the LCAP. It was important for our stakeholders to have additional Social Emotional Learning support in order to provide students with additional tools to best cope with anxiety, depression, and other mental health challenges. In addition, there was expressed need to provide support, professional development, and curriculum to help staff and students understand and support students with the trauma they may have experienced. Goal 2 has many actions based on student feedback, including a consultant to provide Makerspace activities that will include collaborative group activities. Action 3 provides IT support to ensure continued access to student devices for online learning, college and career exploration, and online research. Action 6 includes an SEL online learning program to allow independent online learning in areas of student need and interest. To improve the inclusion of our students with disabilities, specific actions related to access to core content and transitions were added. Goal 1, Action 2 was influenced by our staff input regarding increase professional development in the areas of trauma, social/emotional learning, and mental health needs. All of the input provided by the stakeholders was considered and when appropriate influenced the goals and actions in the final LCAP.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Many youths who are served at Tehama Oaks have missed large amounts of school due to transiency or truancy. Many are lacking the skills necessary to meet California Graduation Requirements. We provide a safe, supportive learning environment where students are able to focus on school, make progress in filling learning gaps, and earning credits toward graduation. As our students are typically only enrolled with Tehama Oaks for a limited time we must be intentional and provide the greatest opportunity for progress possible so they are able to re-enter their school of residence upon release. In order to make the greatest use of our time, it is imperative that students have access to rigorous and relevant coursework as well as the opportunity to develop their social-emotional skills. This broad goal provides a road map for our staff that focuses on the whole student during the time that they are incarcerated to ensure they have no breaks in their education and are increasing academic skills and understanding of options after graduation including college or career pathways. In the development of this goal, pairing appropriate metrics with the actions provide the roadmap for our team as to what our desired outcomes are incrementally and how we are going to know we are or are not making progress toward those goals. In order to know this information, there must be a measure that is utilized to collect the data to make informed decisions and any adjustments that may be necessary along the way. We have had excellent stability with our staff. This staff have been very involved in trauma-informed training and a culture summit training. One teacher has been engaged in the TCDE social/emotional CADRE and leadership focus. Overall, staff effectiveness has been enhanced through comprehensive PD and providing supports for the academic progress of students.

All actions were completed as described. Due to the small program, it is challenging to find staff who are able to realistically cover academics and a broad CTE scope. This creates a gap of resources. Hiring a full time administrator and full time teacher will provide additional supports and resources.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

- Action 1.1: Modified action to address the need of maintaining staff who are able to directly support the SEL and academic needs of students more directly.
- Action 1.2: Increase: Due to an increase in professional development opportunities for our staff and negotiated settlements, the costs were higher for certificated staffing than planned.
- Action 1.4: Decrease: We were unable to hire an individual, as planned, to fill this position. As funds were utilized to support current staff, the budgeted allocation was not needed.
- Action 1.5: Decrease: The special education billback was decreased over anticipated amounts during the 22/23 school year.

All actions were carried out and have successfully contributed to student wellbeing. Students are learning math skills and reading books. The TCDE College/Career program has helped. More art and music has been added. Overall, the students are observed staying more engaged, compliant, and focused on the program being offered. Academics data shows a large growth, especially in Math. CTE continues to be a challenge due to the limited time many students are with us and the challenges of being able to do hands-on skills with juvenile hall students.

Significant progress was made towards this goal as reflected in the positive responses by students on the survey. Supports were consistently offered and vocational and hands-on activities increased.

Challenges continue to be found in meeting the individual needs of students who are within the justice system, who have experiences high levels of trauma and disfunction and having a staff who are able to address these challenges in a way that helps motivate students to positively regard their future. Adding staff to specifically address these need is essential.

All listed actions were completed as listed.

- Action 2.4: Increase: As noted above, additional expense from added services and supports of the counselor to address trauma-informed strategies and needs of students.
- Action 2.5: Decrease: Due to being unable to hire a Transition Specialist, this work was completed by outside contractors and providing additional time for our staff to engage with probation.

We have incorporated general educational vocation skills which has been well received by the students. The facility is working on adding a wood shop with our students helping to build this program. Makerspace activities have also been incorporated. The virtual reality program has added vocational exploration opportunities (fire fighting, auto repair, manufacturing, carpentry). We desire to continue developing strategies for addressing the CTE offerings of our students. We are also attempting to hire a new teacher to support dual enrollment courses for our students. Percentage of students completing educational plans has continued to increase. as has the qualitative feedback on the school climate and relationships between students and staff.

For each action being provided to an entire school, or across the entire school district or county office of education (COE), an explanation of (1) how the needs of foster youth, English learners, and low-income students were considered first, and (2) how these actions are effective in meeting the goals for these students.

Action 1.1: As identified by the staff and through an analysis of academic assessment and classroom work samples, we have identified that our EL, FY, and LI student groups are struggling in the area of meeting academic requirements, developing relationships with adults, and developing SEL skills. To address these needs we will use funding to maintain lower student/teacher ratios below the required ratio to provide more direct and positive relationships between teacher/student as they address the needs of the unduplicated student. This allows a stronger focus on supporting students in the area of social, emotional, academic, and behavioral needs of the incarcerated student. By providing these services, we expect that the percentage of students will increase in successfully completing a broad course of study, scoring higher on ELA and Math CAASP testing, and being prepared for college. It is our expectation that by better understanding the needs of our unduplicated students and by monitoring them closer, we will see more progress in these students above that of those students who are not unduplicated.

Action 1.6: As identified by engagement partner surveys and local indicators their is a need to provide strong administrator leadership to guide the enhancement of the school's vision, develop a strong collaborative understanding of all partners in the needs of the schools and to facilitate implementing effective strategies for addressing these needs. To address this need, we will use funds to hire a full time administrator who will be able to leadership and access to resources that provide staff with the tools to meet the needs of the unduplicated students in the area of academics, SEL, CTE, and STEM supports. By providing a full time administrator we expect that the percentage of

unduplicated students engaging in and passing CTE courses and advanced placement examinations as well as providing students with higher levels of access to STEM related courses. It is our expectations that by providing this high level of leadership, staff will be able to engage more fully with the unduplicated students that will help them make more progress than that of those students who are not unduplicated.

Action 2.2: As identified by the staff and conversations with students, we have identified that our EL, FY, and LI students groups are not as engaged in supplemental learning through hands-on activities that promote 21st century learning skills that help them making meaningful connections with learning. To address this need we will provide access to makerspace activities that integrate core curricular concepts in a meaningful and motivational manner that will help the unduplicated students make stronger positive connections with learning and STEM. By providing these services, we expect that the percentage of our unduplicated students with access to Makerspace activities will increase. It is our expectations that providing these activities to our unduplicated students will help them engage more meaningfully and be more motivated than those students who are not unduplicated.

Action 2.9: As identified by staff and a review of student participation in college/career coursework, we have identified that our EI, FY, and LI students are not engaging fully in college/career related coursework that can be effectively provided through dual enrollment courses with our local colleges. To address this need we will hire an additional teacher who will monitor student outcomes (grades and engagement) and monitor student participation and success in each course of study with a focus on coordinating Tier 2 and Tier 3 supports for students who need additional intervention.
