Part I. Service Needs, Priorities & Strategy – (Government Code Section 30061(b)(4)(A))

A. Assessment of Existing Services

Glenn County is a small, rural county that has limited access to additional, community-based resources. The at-risk juvenile population is primarily served by county-based governmental organizations such as the Glenn County Probation Department, Glenn County Sheriff's Office, Glenn County Behavioral Health, the Health and Human Services Agency, the Children's Inter-Agency Coordinating Council (CICC), and Children's System of Care (CSOC). The Boys and Girls Club of the North Valley has operated in the unincorporated area of Hamilton City, serving approximately 200 children and their families annually. A feasibility study was previously completed in the City of Willows to determine if the City would support a teen center operated by the Boys and Girls Club. Although the study revealed a lack of financial support, ongoing efforts are being made to identify additional fiscal resources to support a program.

Describe what approach will be used to facilitate collaboration amongst the organizations listed above and support the integration of services.

A benefit of a small county is that partner agencies involved in the coordination of services have strong working relationships. Glenn County continues to utilize the Multi-Agency Planning (MAP) group to facilitate collaboration amongst allied agencies and service providers. The format of these are similar to that of a Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) approach to staff cases involving at-risk youth, or youth currently on informal/formal probation. Accordingly, the probation department regularly participates in Child and Family Team (CFT) meetings. At these meetings, the youth and their family may request specific persons to be included on the Child and Family Team and be invited to the CFT meeting to include but not limited to the following: the youth, biological parents, the caregiver, the placing agency caseworker, a representative from probation and/or child welfare, mental health, representatives and providers (required to be present the meeting if placement into a short-term residential therapeutic treatment program of FFA that provides treatment services has occurred or is being considered), formal support services (i.e. treatment and educational professionals), extended family members, and informal support persons (i.e. friends, coaches, church representatives, or tribe members).

The purpose of the CFT meeting is to assemble the people involved in the child's life to determine how best to address the child's needs and achieve positive outcomes of safety, permanency, and well-being. Gathering people who have unique information about the

child and who the child is familiar with enables the various county partner agencies to identify supports and services needed to achieve permanency, enable a child to live in the least restrictive setting, and promote normal childhood experiences with an emphasis on trauma informed care.

B. Identifying and Prioritizing Focus Areas

Glenn County's rural character and historical data indicate no specific hotspots for juvenile crime across neighborhoods, schools, or communities. Higher numbers of juvenile arrests and citations in the City of Orland are largely attributed to its size, dedicated police department, and presence of a school resource officer, rather than an elevated crime concentration. Over the past decade, juvenile referrals to probation have steadily declined, leading to smaller caseloads and enabling probation staff to focus more resources and attention on the youth currently under supervision. Ongoing collaboration between allied agencies and providers allow for continued identification of current trends and criminality involving juveniles in the county allowing for early intervention and or preventative measures.

C. Juvenile Justice Action Strategy

In 2017, Glenn County closed the Jahn Hahn Juvenile Hall and partnered with neighboring counties, beginning with Tehama and later expanding to Sonoma, Mendocino, Yolo, Butte, and Yuba, to house detained youth. Despite relying on external facilities, the county remains committed to rehabilitation through innovative, evidence-based, and trauma-informed approaches rather than incarceration alone. Reduced caseloads allow probation staff to respond more effectively, using graduated sanctions to address both negative and positive behaviors. Notably, juvenile probation staffing is currently supported without reliance on the county's general fund.

Glenn County has not had any commitments to the Department of Juvenile Justice for more than a decade.

D. Comprehensive Plan Revisions

This year's revisions to the plan as previously mentioned were the additional contracts obtained for the housing of detained youth in addition to Tehama County. Those additions include Sonoma County, Yuba County (Maxine Singer Youth Guidance Center), Yolo County, Butte County and Mendocino County. Each of the counties offer unique programs for youth housed in their facilities which allows Glenn County additional options for detained youth and additional programs to better suite each youth's individual needs.

The Glenn County Probation department currently utilizes Corrections Software Solutions (CSS), out of Texas, and has been using it since 2011. Within this system, we are able to generate a variety of statistical reports and share information with various county partners. Glenn County Sheriff's Office Communications Center has access to the system to allow dispatch staff to relay probation information to officers responding to calls for service.

The Glenn County District Attorney's Office and Office of the Public Defender are currently in the process of utilizing a case management system (Karpel), which will allow for and enhance communication between the District Attorney's Office, Public Defender, Superior Court, and Probation.

Early intervention at the lowest possible level has been proven to be an effective method in reducing the likelihood of further involvement in the juvenile justice system. As a result of this program, we have seen our juvenile probation population on either formal or informal juvenile probation significantly decline.

A. Strategy for Non-707(b) Offenders

The Glenn County Probation Department's strategy for non-707(b) offenders is detailed in the last CMJJP. For the housing of detained youth Glenn County currently contracts with the Tehama County Probation Department, Sonoma County Probation Department, Yuba County Probation Department (Maxine Singer Youth Guidance Center), Butte County Probation Department, Mendocino County Probation Department and Yolo County Probation Department. Of which, Tehama County, Sonoma County, and Butte County are Secure Youth facilities. The Maxine Singer Youth Guidance Center also housed Secure Youth as a lesser or step-down facility. Considerable emphasis in handling cases of juvenile delinquency at the lowest possible level that relies heavily on evidence-based risk and needs assessments and in developing a meaningful case plan with the input from the minor, their parents and probation officer.
